Launch of the World Migration Policy Toolkit

The toolkit was developed in collaboration with the Global Migration Centre, Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies, and funded by the Geneva Science-Policy Interface. The toolkit is designed to support policy officers and other stakeholders in leveraging migration research from the World Migration Report Series for evidence-based policymaking.

The World Migration Policy Toolkit was officially launched during the roundtable discussion "Bridging the Divide: Science -Policy Collaboration to Support the Uptake of Research by Policymakers" at the ACUNS Annual Meeting, held in Geneva from 23 to 25 June 2022. The roundtable was chaired by Eva Åkerman Börje (Director of the Department of Policy & Research at IOM), with presentations by Marie McAuliffe (Head of Research & Publications at IOM), José Ignacio Martín Galán (Head of Online Communications at IOM), Shaun Choon (Permanent Mission of Australia to the UN in Geneva), Angela Dourado (Permanent Mission of Portugal to the UN in Geneva), Frédérique Guérin (University of Geneva and Geneva Science-Policy Interface), and Cecilia Cannon (Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies).

The <u>WMR Interactive Platform</u> was recently recognized in the <u>2022 iNOVA Awards</u>, winning gold in the non-profit organizations category. The WMR Interactive Platform was also recognized by the <u>2022 Questar Awards</u>, winning gold in the interactive annual report and non-profit organizations categories, in addition to being nominated for the <u>World Summit on</u> the Information Society (WSIS) prizes for 2022.

In 2021 the WMR Interactive Platform won the silver and bronze awards in the microsite and non-profit organizations categories of the <u>2021 iNOVA Awards</u>. The WMR 2020 was also recognized in the <u>2021 International Annual Report Design Awards</u> (IADA), winning gold in the online category for the interactive platform and silver for the PDF version of the report.



The Workshop was held at IOM HQ in Geneva and was an opportunity for authors to discuss and receive feedback on their draft chapters.





WMR 2022 media coverage

- Between 1 December 2021 (launch of the WMR) and 31 December 2022, the report was mentioned in more than 700 articles.
- Media articles languages included English, Chinese, German, Hindi, Indonesian, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Malay, Persian, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish, Turkish, and Ukrainian.

Según el "Reporte Migratorio Mundial 2022" de la Organización Internacional para las Migraciones (OIM), para 2020 había alrededor de 281 millones de migrantes internacionales. Sin embargo, en los últimos dos años han ocurrido importantes eventos de migración y desplazamiento debido a conflictos o a una grave inestabilidad económica y política. La Organización de Naciones Unidas también resalta los desplazamientos provocados por desastres climáticos.

Gender and Migration Research Policy Action Lab (GenMig)

GenMig is a new cross-departmental initiative under the leadership of DDG for Operations, Ugochi Daniels, and managed by the Department of Policy and Research. It is designed as a highly collaborative venture, drawing upon expertise and networks in both research and policy.

GenMig is grounded in the continuing need to improve gender equality throughout the migration cycle by leveraging research for gender-responsive policy and programmatic responses.

Extending gender and migration research

Funded by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC), MRPD released a new publication on <u>"The impacts of COVID-19 on migration and migrants from a gender perspective"</u>.

The public virtual launch took place on 1 June 2022 and featured opening remarks by Ugochi Daniels (Deputy Director General for Operations) and Stephanie Leung (Director, International Migration Policy, IRCC), followed by a panel discussion with Céline Bauloz (head, Migration Research Unit at IOM), Prof. Denise Spitzer (University of Alberta), Prof. Roberto Ariel Abeldaño Zuñiga (Universidad de Sierra Sur), Andrea Kvietok Dueñas (Universidad del Pacifico), and Bosco Nizeimana (Senior Research Analyst, The Africa Centre for Strategic Progress).

The event was moderated by Marie McAuliffe (Head of IOM Research and Publications) with Prof. Jenna Hennebry (Balsillie School of International Affairs) as the discussant. Eva Åkerman Börje (Director of Policy & Research at IOM) provided closing remarks.










IOM Publications Platform

The Platform provides a search function with an enhanced list of topics and subtopics. It contains over 2,900 publications in 39 languages. Almost all IOM publications are free to download on the online IOM Publications Platform.



IOM Publications Platform: Key figures

- 2,908 electronic publications in 39 different languages.
- ◆ 305 new publications uploaded in 2022.
- ◆ 250 new publications in one of the three official languages (136 in English, 42 in French and 72 in Spanish), but also in other UN languages such as Arabic (1), Chinese (7), Russian (6), and other languages such as German and Portuguese.
