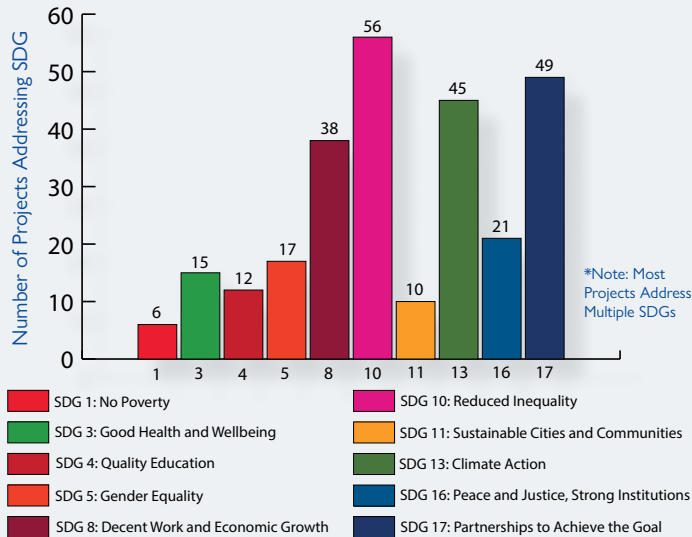


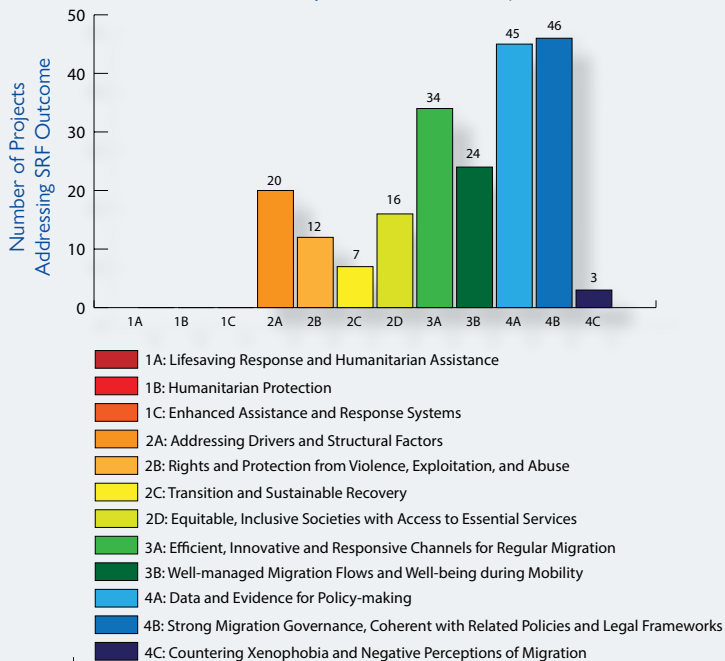
The IOM Development Fund provides seed funding for innovative capacity development initiatives in a range of migration-related areas.

- In 2021, the Fund awarded more than **\$16,000,000** in funding to **58 new projects**, benefitting **67 IOM Member States**.
- Thematic Reviews were conducted of Fund projects related to **Gender, Diaspora Engagement, and Migration Health**.
- A curated booklet was developed cataloguing many of the most successful **Scaled-Up Initiatives** among Fund projects.
- The Fund remains a leading source of knowledge management at IOM, integrating **Results-Based Management practices** into all process and conducting ex-post evaluations on all projects.
- The Fund, in collaboration with the Policy Hub and other others, developed a **Guidance Note on Migration Policy Development**.

Top 10 SDGs Addressed by New 2021 Projects

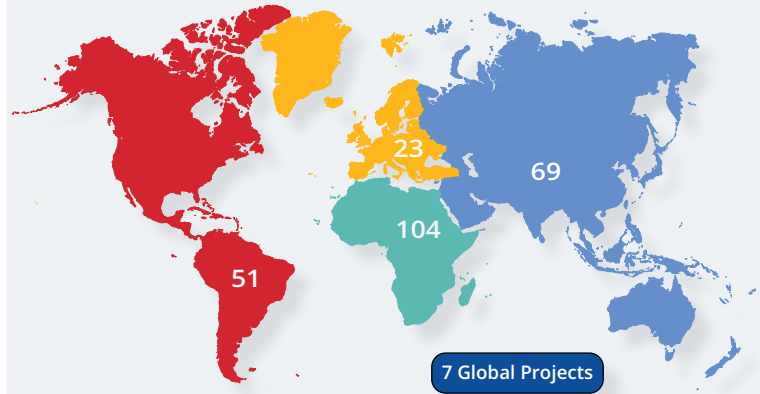


Strategic Results Framework Long-Term Outcomes Addressed by New 2021 Projects

2021 Completed Project Highlights:



The completed projects have been highly visible, including an **innovative project** in Djibouti that constructed a digital Fabrications Lab, and an initiative in Brazil to engage local governments in migration management.

These projects have been featured on UN News and through IOM MCD articles, and the project in Brazil launched an online platform to continue the engagement.



Several projects leveraged **IOM tools**, including Migration Profiles, the IRIS platform, and the Displacement Tracking Matrix.

Several labour migration projects leveraged the IRIS platform to build capacities, and the DTM was successfully adopted in Mongolia to improve data collection on mobility patterns related to climate change and natural hazards.



Diaspora engagement and MECC projects constituted more than 20% of the completed projects in 2021.

Across both thematic areas, projects focused on strengthening capacities to both understand and properly integrate diaspora- or MECC-related considerations into national strategies.



Nearly 20% of the completed 2021 projects were related to **migration research and publication**.

These projects funded the completion of Migration Profiles, helped establish a data portal in Tunisia and provided 10 grants for under researched migration topics in Senegal, among other things.
