15:00 – 15:45	<p>Session II: Access to migration detention for the provision of humanitarian assistance and services (Plenary)</p> <p><i>This session will look into humanitarian access to people held in migration detention in crisis contexts. Despite the increased support at the international level to alternatives to immigration detention, it still continues to be used as a means to control and fight irregular migration. Crisis contexts pose particular challenges.</i></p> <p><i>Panelists will examine the shaping environment, existing good practice and IOM-NGO complementarities, and look into alternatives to migration detention as a mid- to long-term solution. The session will also discuss humanitarian interventions in detention centers in crisis contexts, which represent the last resort short-term response to the immediate suffering.
