

What is the Budapest Process?

- Longest standing intergovernmental migration dialogue of its kind
- 50+ participating countries and 10+ organisations engaged
- 2 geographical expansions
- A widened thematic scope covering each aspect of migration cooperation
- Focus on the Silk Routes region since 2010
- A few figures over the last 25 years 160 intergovernmental meetings
 - » 6 Ministerial Conferences
 - » 24 Senior Officials Meetings
 - » 190+ working groups and other meetings
 - » 1400+ participants from 2013-2018

MEETING STRUCTURE OF THE BUDAPEST PROCESS



MINISTERIAL CONFERENCES

When: 5 conferences in 25 years

What: Backbone for the dialogue's governance and thematic direction. Decides on the guiding texts (Ministerial declarations)

Who: Minister level

STRATEGY

SENIOR OFFICIALS MEETINGS

When: 30+ meetings in 25 years, meets annually

What: Main decision making to steer the Process

Who: Senior Official level

FRIENDS OF THE CHAIR MEETINGS

When: Upon request of the Chair

What: Advise the Chair on strategic matters and governance

Who: Senior Officials from donors and selected participating states **OPERATIONAL**

THEMATIC OR REGIONAL WORKING GROUP MEETINGS

When: Annual or bi-annual

What: Thematic or regional as

per 3 regions

Who: Expert-level

AD HOC MEETINGS

When: Upon demand

What: Training or workshop style

Who: Expert-level



Sustainability of the dialogue

- Sustainability through policy relevant objectives in line with states priorities, clear structures and regular meetings.
- The Budapest Process has overtime achieved sustained success through:
 - » Adapting to changing realities and needs
 - » Creating close links and friendships between experts and countries
 - » Sense maker of migration developments from national to global at regional level
 - » Concrete tool for policy advancement and capacity-building
 - » Stayed politically relevant for 25 years of differing migration realities



Ministerial Conference 2019: The Istanbul Commitments on the Silk Routes Partnership for Migration

In February 2019, close to 40 Ministers from the Budapest Process participating countries, the European Commissioner for Migration, Home Affairs and Citizenship and representatives of relevant organisations agreed

- to take concerted action to endorse and implement the five-year plan "a Call for Action" following the priority goals of the 2013 Istanbul Ministerial Declaration
- to ensure safe, orderly and regular migration along the Silk Routes by applying five key commitments to
 - Partnership
 - Comprehensive migration governance
 - 3 Respect, protect and fulfil international human rights and fundamental freedoms
 - 4 Support and solidarity
 - 5 Knowledge
