POST MORA SITUATION OVERVIEW

IOM currently coordinates and provides services to approximately 132,000 Rohingya 80,000 Undocumented Myanmar Nationals displaced in Bangladesh. Most of the Rohingya in Cox's Bazar are not registered as refugees and live makeshift settlements. Due limited resources and ability to build solid shelters and infrastructure, they were particularly hard hit by cyclone Mora which made landfall in Bangladesh's coastal region in the morning of 30th May 2017, with heavy rains and winds estimated at 117 km/h (73mph). Approximately 2,811,465 people live across 12 high-risk coastal districts in Bangladesh that were exposed to the cyclone. Continued rain is exacerbating the situation for those whose homes have been destroyed.

> The cyclone has severely impacted the makeshift settlements which housed over 100,000 Rohingyas, with 17,000 homes destroyed, 243 latrines and tube wells made One health facility impaired, women children and exposed to abuse and exploitation due to a lack of safe spaces.

> Among all the makeshift settlements, the new settlement in Balukhali, which houses most of the newly arrived Rohingyas, has been worst affected due to the areas' sandy soil structure and the very light weight structures that had only been in place for a few months.

> The funding requirement under this Appeal responds to the immediate needs in shelter, health, WASH and protection, arising after the cyclone, carried out as part of IOM's existing humanitarian program in coordination with relevant partners.

Health

The cyclone Mora has severely damaged the IOM managed health clinic in Leda makeshift settlement and mobile health centers in Balukhali makeshift settlement. On average, Leda clinic provides services to 400-500 Rohingyas and host community members per day, and Balukhali around I 00 Rohingyas per day. Immediate attention is needed in the following areas:

- Reconstruction and rebuilding of health facilities in Leda and Balukhali
- Repair/Provision of medical equipment in health clinics
- Provision of health supplies across the health centers and facilities responding to the affected people, in particular for treatment of broken bones and deep cuts

Shelter and Non-Food Items

The initial assessment suggests that all the bamboo structures have been damaged extensively particularly in Balukhali where a preliminary estimate is that 80% of the shelters built were destroyed. Kutupalong makeshift settlement extension also witnessed considerable damage to shelters and facilities. Most of the possessions left behind in the shelters are partially or fully damaged. There is an urgent need to provide shelter support and essential basic NFIs, including cooking materials, clothing, mosquito nets and blankets to the affected households.

The initial assessment reveals that the cyclone has damaged the WASH facilities in the MS, especially Kutupalong and Balukhali sanitation facilities. Also, there is a threat of salinization of ground water in the coastal areas of Cox's Bazar such as Shamlapur village, which hosts a considerable number of Rohingya refugees. The urgent attention is needed in:

- Restoration of damaged sanitation facilities in the MS
- Provision of emergency latrines
- Provision of Hygiene kits

Protection

There are immediate concerns expressed by the community members pertaining to vulnerable groups, for example, female headed households, child headed households, pregnant/lactating mothers, single elderly persons and single disabled persons who are facing different challenges in rebuilding their shelters and accessing support. Damage to the health clinics has aggravated the situation further as services are now further away. This makes the population more vulnerable and additional assistance may require in due course. Therefore, IOM would like to increase the capacity of its needs and population monitoring intervention to better understand the requirements of the community. Given the current situation, there is an immediate need to address the following:

- Information dissemination about available GBV services and dangers of trafficking in persons
- Systematically capture the evolving needs and movement dynamics of UMNs
- Provision of dignity kits for women
- Provision of psycho-social support for the most vulnerable
