



IOM REGIONAL RESPONSE TO THE SYRIA CRISIS • 2015



- Syria: IOM reached an overall 61,101 beneficiaries in seven governorates with NFIs, providing transportation assistance to UNICEF, UNHCR, WFP and WHO, with IOM managing six convoys, including 93 trucks. From its cross border hub in Turkey, IOM provided vocational training to 52 beneficiaries.
- Jordan: IOM provided awareness raising sessions on human trafficking to Syrian refugees in Za'atari and Azraq camps as part of the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence Campaign, provided to 267 boys and girls from both camps.
- Iraq: IOM continues to assist urban Syrian refugees and host communities with winterization support, reaching over 11,000 beneficiaries with fuel vouchers, targeting the most vulnerable 30% of the Syrian refugee population in Iraq under the Basic Needs Sector.
- Turkey: IOM, together with its implementing partners, reached 28,262 beneficiaries with winterization activities and hygiene items this month. This included the distribution of Evouchers, stoves, and coal.
- Lebanon: IOM continues to provide regular health education and awareness raising activities on child nutrition, hepatitis, immunization, measles, tuberculosis, and others important public-health issues to refugees and local communities.



Update on the Humanitarian Situation

Further fighting in northern Syria has caused 20,000 people to be displaced in December from Aleppo, Idleb, and Hama. Most IDPs are staying close to their areas of origin, placing more pressure on host communities, while others are moving to existing IDP settlements near the Turkish border. From its Turkey cross border hub, IOM distributed tents, sealing-off kits (SOKs) and winterized NFIs, NFI kits for the newly displaced, over a thousand tons of coal, and boots and jackets for children.

Ongoing fighting in Sheikh Miskine, Dar'a governorate has also created a humanitarian emergency, leaving people in urgent need of medical care, food, clean water, and NFIs. Since 8 December, the last remaining 10,250 cilvilians have fled to nearby villages.

Livelihood Project in Aleppo

From its cross border hub in Turkey, IOM continues to provide livelihood interventions for 52 beneficiaries enrolled in vocational training. Once training is completed, all beneficiaries will receive tool kits to enable them to start income generating activities, including tailoring, motorcycle repair, electric appliances repair, and hairdressing.

Interventions include supporting TB diagnostics and treatment services, improving knowledge of the TB epidemic and coordination of the TB response, and raising awareness of TB among target populations.



Community Support Project in Akkar

IOM Lebanon has partnered with a local NGO in North Lebanon to implement a community support project engaging 240 previously unemployed Syrian refugees and Lebanese youth. Activities include the repair, rehabilitation, and clean-up of Wadi Khaled's main road, overall benefiting eight municipalities of Akkar. This short term employment opportunity is providing a constructive alternative to negative coping strategies. The project also targets local host community members.

Through Their Eyes

Ayaz Farhan fled his home in Qamishli city, Syria over two years ago with his brother's family.

They now live in a rented house in Daratu district, near Erbil City, northwest of Baghdad.

"In past winters I bought fuel on a weekly basis; a 20-liter container cost IQD 20,000 to 30,000 [approximately USD 20 to 30] which is a lot of money. We could only afford to use the heater for five hours per night to keep the children warm, and we were still not warm enough. Thanks to IOM, we now have this barrel of kerosene. It will protect us against the cold, especially because there are not a lot of work opportunities this year, meaning I can't afford to buy fuel on my own."

Transportation Assistance and Livelihood Support

IOM continues to support Syrian refugees in both their movement into Iraq and to other countries, as well as providing support to their families during their time of displacement through livelihood support projects. These include vocational and on-the-job training coupled with training toolkits, as well as business development support including business training and in-kind packages to establish or expand a business, and rehabilitating business premises for existing businesses

Since the beginning of the Syrian Crisis, IOM lhas provided transportation to over 100,000 refugees, and livelihood support for over 4,000 persons.

Global Refugee Youth Consultation and Trainings

As part of the Global Refugee Youth Consultation in Jordan held between 7 and 10 December, IOM participated in a dialogue between stakeholders, refugees and the Jordanian youth, ensuring that they have the opportunity to voice their opinions on matters that affect them.

IOM also provided counter-trafficking training to 15 NGO workers addressing protection issues involving refugees in urban settings, as well as implemented a humanitarian border management training to strengthen the capacity of Jordanian Border Authorities to safeguard humanitarian principles during interactions with and provision of humanitarian assistance to Syrian refugees.



Celebrating International Migrants Day

In honour of International Migrants Day, IOM Jordan participated in a global candlelight vigil to commemorate the lives of those who have died or disappeared while attempting the perilous sea journey. In addition, an event was organised in coordination with the Ministry of Labour to celebrate migrants and their contributions to Jordan, attended by INGOs, NGOs, and UN agencies alongside migrants from different countries.



Community Centre Support

IOM continues to coordinate with the Support to Life (STL) centre in Sanliurfa by providing psycho-social support, life skills and recreational activities like Arabic, math, and drawing classes to Syrian children in the area

On 12 December, IOM and STL organised "A Future Together" festival, which was attended by 200 children who participated in different events like story-telling, face painting, and theatre plays.



Primary Healthcare for Syrian Refugees in Istanbul

IOM continues to support Doctors Worldwide Turkey and their clinic in the Fatih district through the provision of primary health care services to Syrian refugees. The clinic provides basic health services, including paediatric, women's pathogenesis, internal diseases, general surgery, and laboratory analysis services. Additionally, the clinic also provides free medicine through its pharmacy.

Since the start of the project, the clinic has asissetd 6,392 patients.

UPDATE ON WINTERIZATION ACTIVITIES

Regional Winter Assistance

As Syria and the region continues to experience harsh winter conditions including snow and temperatures that are dropping below zero, winterization activities have been ongoing within Syria and in neighbouring countries.

As part of the Syria Response Plan and the winterization campaign, IOM from its Damascus office reached 17,640 individuals in cross-line and hard-to-reach areas in Homs and Aleppo governorates with blankets, mattresses, plastic mats, rechargeable lights, and underwear kits, providing 8,500 winterization kits. From its cross-border hub in Amman, IOM procured and delivered 1,000 shelter sealing-off kits (SOKs) and 1,000 olive bit bricks for heating purposes to southern Syria. The SOKs are anticipated to be installed in January 2016. In northern Syria, IOM's cross-border team from Gaziantep, through its implementing partners, distributed 2,050 tents, 350 SOKs and winterized NFIs, and 7,000 boots and jackets for children.

IOM Turkey, as part of the Regional Refugee Response Plan, reached 28,262 individuals with winterization and hygiene items. With its implementing partner Care, 6,217 people received E-vouchers, 2,205 people were provided with coal and 4,940 with stoves and coal.

In south Lebanon, 200 Syrian refugee families who have been living in informal settlements and other substandard dwelling received shelter repair kits in order to be better prepared for the winter conditions. IOM also finalised the cash-based winter assistance to a total of 1,422 vulnerable Lebanese returnee families living in the Bekaa and north Lebanon, with each household receiving a total of USD 400.

In Iraq, IOM supported the most vulnerable members of urban Syrian refugee and host community populations with 11,000 fuel vouchers.
