




RETURNS & REINTEGRATION

13,034 Returnees (11,081 M / 1,953 F) from KSA and other countries have benefitted from post-arrival assistance. Non-KSA returnees received health screening, accommodation and food, onward transport assistance, cash grants, psychosocial counselling, economic, and social support, as required



- Vulnerable returnees from KSA assisted with onward transportation allowance (OTA)
- 541 KSA returnees benefitted from NFIs support; clothes, footwear & towels
- Female KSA returnees referred to Penda Manufacturing PLC for job interviews
- 17 UMC assisted with Family Tracing and Reintegration (FTR) support



REGIONAL MIXED MIGRATION PROGRAMME - EHOA

Participants comprised of government experts from Djibouti, Ethiopia, Somalia and the United Republic of Tanzania attended a Regional Technical Meeting (RTM) on Mixed Migration in the East and Horn of Africa region held in Dar es salaam, Tanzania. The RTM aimed to support and ensure government commitments, especially line ministries associated with migrant protection as well as foster technical discussions and collaboration on cross-border mixed migration issues.

Frontline officers providing assistance and services to vulnerable groups including vulnerable migrants such as victims of trafficking and Unaccompanied Migrant Children (UMCs) attended a five-day training workshop on referral mechanisms in Zanzibar, Tanzania. The training workshop was organized for Anti-Trafficking Committee and its Secretariat and stakeholders including NGOs/CSOs.

Officers working with vulnerable groups including migrants attended a four-day workshop in Arusha, Tanzania to support the dissemination of Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) for Protecting, Assisting and Referring Vulnerable Migrants including Victims of Trafficking. The workshop familiarized and reinforced the capacity of frontline workers on the procedures in place as well as roles of each actors towards ensuring effective response and protection services to vulnerable migrants.

Representatives from different districts, the Ministry of the Interior, the Ministry of Women and Family, the Ministry of Health, ONARS and international (UNICEF, IOM, ICRC) and national (UNFD, Red Crescent, CARITAS, etc.) organizations attended a workshop on Operationalization of the National Referral Mechanism for Vulnerable Migrants in Djibouti.

Participants representing Uganda, Kenya, Ethiopia, Rwanda, Tanzania, Somalia, South Sudan and Djibouti IOM offices participated in a two-day Regional Migrant Protection and Assistance (MPA) retreat organized in Nairobi, Kenya. This is the first time an MPA related event was organized convening PRM target countries and also IOM EHOA countries. The retreat provided a great opportunity to learn how programmes in the region conduct MPA activities in the different national contexts.

Representatives from the Ministry of Justice, Somaliland National Human Rights Commission (SLNHRC), Immigration office, Coast Guard, Regional Governor Office, and Returnee Community, Regional Governor Office and Migration Response Centre (MRC) attended a two day roll-out training on Assistance to Vulnerable Migrants (AVM) held in Hargeisa, Somaliland. The training covered several topics, among them: Trafficking in Persons (TiPs), Determinants of Migrants Vulnerability Model (DoVM), identification of vulnerable migrants, unaccompanied and separated migrant children, as well as interview techniques and screening form.





SPECIAL LIAISON UNIT

A high-level delegation from the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida) led by the Director General, Ms. Carin Jämtin, visited Addis Ababa and discussed with the implementing partners progress, lessons learned, and opportunities in the implementation of the Sida-funded Priority Implementation Actions of the AU-ILO-IOM-ECA Joint Programme on Labour Migration Governance for Development and Integration in Africa ('JLMP Priority' 2018-2021) project.

JLMP programme steering committee members comprised of representatives from the AUC, IOM, ILO, Organization of African Trade Union Unity (OATUU), The African Regional Organization of the International Trade Union Confederation (ITUC Africa) and Business Africa and African Regional Economic Communities (REC's) held its second meeting to discuss progress made in achieving the objectives of the JLMP by the contributing projects, namely the JLMP priority project.

Participants from the Intergovernmental Authority on Development (IGAD), Diaspora African Forum, Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA), Women in Cross Border Trade, Pan African Parliament (PAP), East Africa Trade Union Confederation (EATUC), Organization of Africa Trade Union Unity (OATUU), EAC, AUC, IOM and ILO attended The AU Labour Migration Advisory Committee (LMAC) fifth assessment mission to the East African Community (EAC) in Arusha, Tanzania. The purpose of the assessment mission was to introduce the JLMP and the three-year JLMP Priority Project (priority JLMP) to stakeholders and gather information, understand and share experiences on the national and regional policy frameworks and legal instruments regulating labour migration in the EAC.

Participants from AU Member States, Regional Economic Communities (RECs), UN Agencies, international development partners, civil society organizations, trade unions, diaspora organizations and members of the academia attended the 5th Pan African Forum on Migration in Cairo, Egypt under the theme: "Strengthening Migration Data and Research for evidence-based policy development and implementation towards effective migration governance in Africa". IOM Ethiopia, IOM Geneva, IOM Regional Office in Cairo and IOM-Egypt supported the AU technically and logistically in the organization of the event. The Forum adopted its guidelines and its report will be tabled before the Specialised Technical Committee on Migration, Refugees and IDPs, scheduled for November 2019.
