Marking the Closure of the Ebola Treatment Unit in Tubmanburg

Three weeks after the IOM-managed Ebola treatment unit (ETU) in Tubmanburg closed to patients, Bomi County local government leaders, traditional chiefs, women and religious leaders, partners, ETU staff and community members gathered to celebrate the closing. The now fully decontaminated 'red zone' hosted the ceremony that also brought together all the ETU's Ebola survivors.

Chief Gballah Gray speaking on behalf of Bomi County's Chiefs expressed the general sentiment at the gathering as he said, "We are overwhelmed with joy and we thank everyone who is responsible for this day." He acknowledged the value of working together with the community and its leaders to tackle Ebola, saying, "You have done well by recognizing us as traditional leaders and involving us." Read more.



Highlights

Case Management

- Liberia was declared Ebola free on 9 May 2014.
 To build resilience to respond to future health-related challenges, IOM is supporting the County Health Teams (CHTs) to build local capacity for safe isolation, triage and referrals.
- IOM is performing clinical and operational management of one Ebola Treatment Unit (ETU) in Sinje, Grand Cape Mount (GCM) County.
- Tubmanburg ETU, Bomi and Buchanan ETU, Grand Bassa stopped admitting patients on 15 April, and finalized decommissioning of the ETUs in line with World Health Organization (WHO) protocols. An official closing ceremony was held for both ETUs on 8 May
- Since opening in November 2014, 131 patients have been admitted to the 3 IOM ETUs, 12 Survivors have been discharged and there have been 15 EVD related deaths.

Psychosocial Support

- IOM is providing psychosocial support at schools in areas affected by EVD - students and staff are provided with individual and group counselling sessions.
- From 27 April to 17 May, 145 protection cases were identified (66 in Bomi and 79 in GCM) through PSS outreach activities. These cases (i.e. orphans, disabled persons or other people matching protection criteria) are referred to specialized agencies for tailored support.
- IOM GCM visited 13 communities in Golah Konneh and Garwula districts to tackle stigmatization of EVD survivors in the community and promote survivor integration.

Surveillance, Coordination and Capacity Building

- IOM Grand Cape Mount is supporting the CHT with health screening services at Bo Waterside the main border crossing point with Sierra Leone. 39,346 travellers were screened between 27 April and 17 May. IOM also provides screening supervision and ensures provision of Infection, Prevention and Control (IPC) and triage materials at 6 other identified border crossing points (BCPs)
- IOM is providing the required IPC and Wash supplies and supervising activities at 2 county checkpoints in Bomi County and 2 in Grand Cape Mount County.
- IOM Grand Cape Mount conducted a 4-day

Social Mobilization

- IOM led 5 training sessions (3 in Bomi and 2 in GB); 126 gcHVs and community leaders were trained on community preparedness for EVD.
- Between 27 April and 17 May, 10 radio talk shows were held with medical doctors and nurses from the ETUs participating, informing the public on topics, such as the last mile in fighting against the Ebola outbreak, back-toschools programme, mobile clinic and immunization campaign awareness
- IOM is airing daily radio jingles in all 3 counties informing the public on matters, such as the importance of hand washing and EVD prevention measures, as well as the immunization campaigns (8-15 May).

refresher training on primary screening and basic PPE at border crossings in GCM in partnership with the CHT and Global Communities. 35 participants from the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization (BIN) and district and county health officers, as well as gCHVs were trained and provided with on the job mentorship.

Surveillance, Coordination and Capacity Building

- At the request of the CHTS, IOM GB and IOM Bomi assisted with the integrated measles/polio vaccination campaign (8-15 May 2015). IOM Bomi provided logistical support and 3 nurses joined vaccination teams. IOM GB trained 225 vaccinators and provided supervision during the campaign, as well as delivering vaccines and other materials.
- IOM GCM treated 473 patients at 3 mobile clinic visits. In Bomi, the mobile clinic team provided health care services to 1,471 community members.
