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


SITUATION OVERVIEW

- A total of 9 confirmed cases were reported in the week to 12 April, the same total as in the previous week.
- Cases were reported from 3 western districts: Kambia (4 cases), Port Loko (1 case), and Western Area Urban (4 cases), which includes the capital, Freetown.
- A total of 5 Guinean prefectures reported at least one confirmed case in the week to 12 April with transmission remaining confined to the western area, and is primarily focused on the prefecture of Forecariah, which borders Sierra Leone. In total, 8 prefectures/districts in Guinea and Sierra Leone reported a confirmed case in the week to 12 April, compared with 10 the previous week. This is the lowest number of districts to report a confirmed case since the end of May 2014.
- Response indicators from Sierra Leone continue to be encouraging. The number of EVD-positive deaths that were identified in the community after post-mortem testing remained at 3 in the week to 12 April. The low proportion of laboratory samples that tested EVD-positive (9 of 1338: <1%) and the increase in the proportion of cases that arise among registered contacts (67%) strengthen confidence that the downward trend in case incidence will continue.</p>
- With technical guidance from WHO, national authorities have begun
 to implement plans for the phased decommissioning of surplus treatment facilities in Sierra Leone. A core capacity of high-quality Ebola
 treatment centers will be retained that are strategically located to
 ensure complete geographic coverage, with additional rapid-response
 capacity in reserve.

Highlights

- As of 18 April IOM's National Ebola Training Academy has now trained 6,131 health care workers in Freetown and via mobile trainings.
- On April 16, IOM welcomed Dr Aurelien Pekezou to the team as senior Public Health Coordinator.
- Two 3-day mobile trainings on basic Infection Prevention and Control and clinical care were held for 68 healthcare workers in Bo from 13-15 April. This week mobile trainings will be held in Freetown for correctional officers, and in Pujehun and Jendema on the border with Liberia for border officials.





- On 15 April, IOM's Health and Humanitarian Border Management team in collaboration with the US CDC, the Sierra Leone Airport Authority and the Sierra Leone Civil Aviation Authority strengthened Lungi International Airport's health defence system with the construction of two isolation tents graciously donated by the German Federal Agency for Technical Relief.
- On 13 April, Oxfam held a training for 56 social mobilisers from World Hope International (WHI) in Makeni on the use of Interim Care Kits. WHI will distribute 500 kits within Bombali district in partnership with IOM.
- WHI carried out social mobilization activities on the first back to school day at 22 primary and secondary schools within Makeni to sensitize on EVD prevention and observe the Infection Prevention and Control standards utilized in schools. It was recommended that refresher training be conducted on and that interim care kits be provided and teachers trained on their use.

HHBM team continues to strengthen airport screening

Since November of last year, the US Centers for Disease port has been completely reconstructed. This new Control and Prevention (US CDC) has generously funded structure provides much needed shelter from inclement IOM Sierra Leone's Health and Humanitarian Border weather for 24-hour health screening. Management (HHBM) project at Lungi International Airport. For nearly 6 months, IOM monitoring teams in collaboration with the Ministry of Health and Sanitation, the Sierra Leone Airport Authority and the Sierra Leone Civil Aviation Authority have ensured correct Entry and Exit Health Screening practices for approximately 50,000 commercial, private and UN passengers. The robust health defence system developed in collaboration with the Airport Authorities and US CDC now includes 24-hour health screening by medical professionals in the terminal building. This is reinforced by a surrounding ring of checkpoints that conduct basic health screening for everyone entering the airport site.

On 15 April, the airport health defence system was further strengthened with the construction of two isolation tents graciously donated by the German Federal Agency for Technical Relief. This brings the total number of isolation areas up to five; strategically located throughout the airport site. Isolation rooms provide a controlled environment for secondary screening professionals to conduct further medical examinations of anyone identified as a possible Ebola patient. These two new secondary screening sites are a crucial upgrade to the health defence structure as patients need only be moved short distances in order to isolate them.

Furthermore, the airport's outer ring of basic health screening checkpoints has undergone the first upgrade in preparation for the rainy season. One of the front gate health screening posts for drivers entering the air-


