

Hossam, 40, used to manage a small workshop in Syria before the war. He specialized in marble decorations and painting in his town in Idleb. "My friend taught me when I was 17 and I fell in love with it. It's art, and it gives something new each time you work with it". As the conflict got worse, Hossam insisted on remaining in his town, despite being injured three times and no longer able to work with marble. In 2015 a rocket attack struck nearby, injuring his daughter. The local hospitals in Syria could not treat her, so the family left. They went to Turkey, where his daughter received medical care and recovered. Hossam stayed in Turkey out of fear for his family's safety in Syria, but they could not find a decent place to live. "I did not have enough money to rent a good apartment. We had problems with humidity that affected my youngest children's health since they suffered from asthma. The situation was bad". In 2018, Hossam's family was selected for an IOM shelter rehabilitation activity. IOM installed new doors and windows to protect the family from the cold and the rain. The team also repainted the walls to improve their living conditions. "Since IOM refurbished our home, our children's health has improved". Later in 2019, IOM team needed some skilled workers to rehabilitate other people's homes and found out about Hossam's previous experience. "In spite of my injuries, I didn't want to stop working", he said. "I am not able to work in marble anymore but I started to work in painting and decoration". Hossam became a team leader of one of the work groups. "We started to become famous in the area and people started calling us because they didn't know that we are good at this type of work in the past. This project has a long-term impact as we are able to support ourselves".



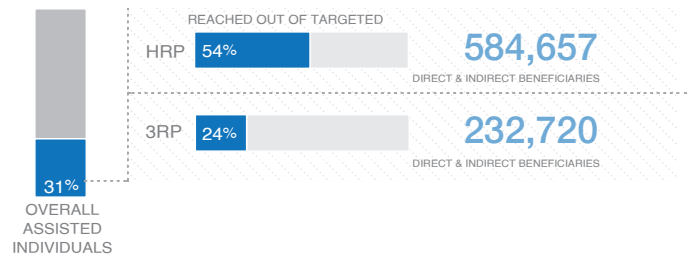
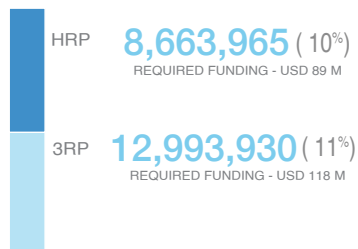

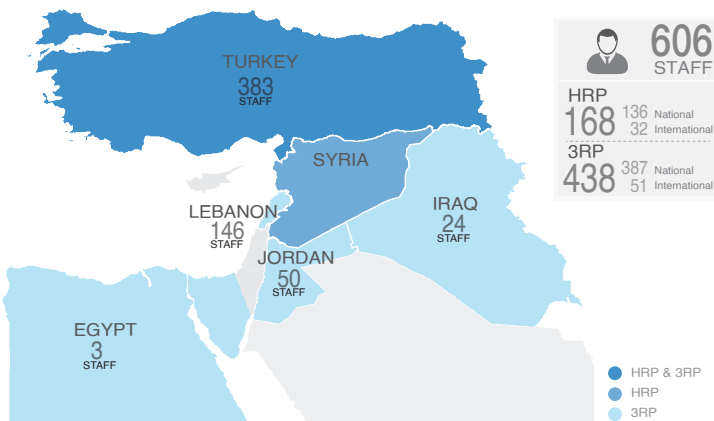

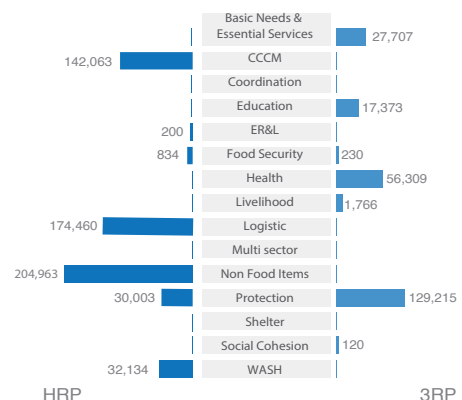

NUMBER OF BENEFICIARIES & KEY SECTORS OF ASSISTANCE



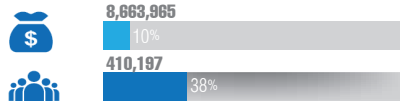
IOM WHOLE OF SYRIA RESPONSE (HRP) - AT A GLANCE

HRP - RESPONSE



Military operations in northern Hama and southern Idlib Governorates intensified significantly from late April onwards, leading to large increases in new displacements during Ramadan and throughout the quarter - over 300,000 IDPs were recorded in north-west Syria by mid-May (HNAP, OCHA, and CCCM cluster). In response, IOM - in collaboration with 30 local partners - provided a wide range of humanitarian assistance and services to displaced communities in Syria, reaching over 165,000 individuals.

Non-Food Items (NFIs): IOM procured and channeled critical Non-Food Items (NFIs) through the humanitarian cluster contingency stock mechanism, the



single-source pipeline modality, and through direct distributions. Over 14,000 NFI kits and close to 5,000 tents were distributed to respond to the needs of the most vulnerable IDPs. With humanitarian needs increasing rapidly, IOM has replenished contingency stocks to enable partners to continue assisting the newly displaced. Significant numbers of IDPs continued to seek shelter in camps and informal settlements, given the limitations on space and appropriate shelter.

Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM): IOM provided support to ensure that needs and gaps were identified, and that services were provided to IDPs in these sites; while also managing

three Reception Centers and one Planned Camp - where close to 4,000 IDPs benefit from safe and dignified shelters and multi-sectoral services.

Shelter Repair and Rehabilitation: IOM's Shelter Repair and Rehabilitation works also enabled IDPs to begin to rebuild their lives - with works ongoing to benefit 260 families.

Water Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH): IOM provided critical Water Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) support, including regular water-trucking for 30,000 individuals in displacement sites, latrine construction, sewage/drainage repair and flood mitigating infrastructure works.

Protection: The conflict continues to highlight the importance of providing Protection assistance. IOM and its partners worked to support IDPs and host communities with integrated protection services and case management on child protection, gender-based violence, civil documentation, as well as housing, land and property (HLP) issues. Over 15,000 individuals benefited from this Protection assistance in April, May and June.

Early Recovery and Livelihoods: For many Syrians, opportunities to work and earn and income are very limited. IOM implemented a variety of Early Recovery and Livelihoods activities aimed at increasing human capital, promoting community engagement, improving access to services, and supporting local economies to help affected communities get back on their feet.

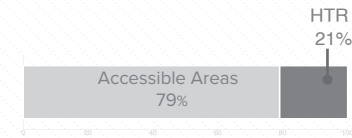

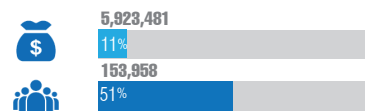

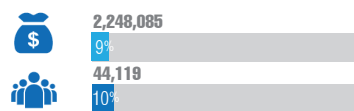
TURKEY



Transportation Assistance: IOM continued to provide the school transportation service in Adana, Sakarya, Yalova, Antalya, Siirt, Batman, and Sanliurfa. In total, 14,980 Syrian students benefited from increased access to education in the second quarter of 2019. The majority of the students supported were in Adana (approximately 70% of the total).

Community Centers: IOM provides a range of services to refugees and host communities in Gaziantep, Istanbul, and Kilis, including language courses, vocational trainings, psychosocial support (counselling, intercultural and sports activities etc.), and legal assistance. In total, 11,063 individuals benefited from the services provided during April, May and June 2019. Conflict management activities are also provided, with 2,253 people attending the different awareness raising and learning events in April, May and June 2019. A call centre is also part of the Istanbul community centre, enabling feedback and complaints to be received and addressed. 929 individuals used this call centre service in the quarter.

JORDAN



Multipurpose Cash: IOM initiated monthly, multi-purpose cash assistance for 211 Syrian refugee households in May 2019, expanding to 270 households in June 2019 (890 individuals). Assistance provided is designed to help cover a household's basic needs each month – calculated in line with Jordan's Survival Minimum Expenditure Basket (SMEB) rates for water, sanitation, rent and utilities. Beneficiaries are among the poorest and most vulnerable families living outside of camps, who are unable to work or have no regular source of income. IOM will phase in additional households for multi-purpose cash assistance each month to reach the overall target of 915 households (each receiving support for 6 months).

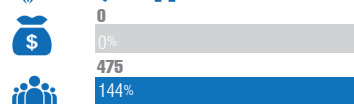
Transportation Assistance: IOM continued to provide needs-based transportation for Syrian refugees in Jordan throughout the second quarter of 2019. In total, 953 Syrian refugees received transportation assistance from IOM, including 88 supported with family reunification between refugee camps, 473 supported with transportation to Jaber border, and 392 supported to meet other transportation needs.

IRAQ



Health support: IOM continues to provide Syrian refugees with awareness sessions on many health topics including general personal hygiene, tuberculosis (TB), diarrhoea, and respiratory and skin diseases. IOM works with community leaders and focal points to transfer the key health messages to camp populations. In April, May and June 2019, IOM reached a total of 203 beneficiaries in Ninewa (Akre and surrounding Syrian refugees schools) and Dahuk (Domiz camp and surrounding areas). **Resettlement support:** IOM continues to support the resettlement process for Syrian refugees. In the second quarter of 2019, IOM facilitated the resettlement process of a total of 356 refugees.

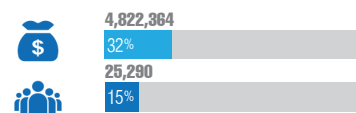
EGYPT



Health promotion: Throughout the quarter, IOM conducted health promotion activities targeting Syrian refugee women and women from the host community. In total, over 150 women participated in the trainings, which were carried out in coordination with local civil society organizations and facilitated by IOM's Medical Health Division. All participants received hygiene kits. IOM also provided equipment for Syria Al Ghad CSO

dental clinic. **Social cohesion/Education:** In May, IOM refurbished the Habibet Al Khair CSO Syrian community school, providing much needed furniture and equipment to improve the conditions for the pupils.

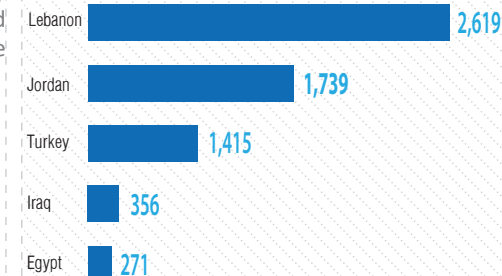
LEBANON



Psychosocial support: In April, May and June, IOM continued to provide psychosocial support services to Syrian refugees and Lebanese hosting communities. The activities were implemented through the two IOM-supported Counselling and Recreational Centers: Dari Centre in Baalbek (Beqaa) and Al Multaqa Centre in Bissariyeh (South), as well as in several informal tented settlements (ITS). In total, 2,748 individuals received psychosocial support this quarter, including 1,535 children between the ages of 6 and 14 years old. **Resettlement Support:** IOM continues to provide resettlement support for refugees from a number of different countries, including Syria. IOM liaises with the immigration departments of resettlement countries, coordinates visa and travel document issuance, travel arrangement, medical screenings prior to departure, and provides cultural orientation. In this quarter, IOM supported 2,619 individuals departing to Australia, Canada, Finland, France, Iceland, Ireland, New Zealand, Norway, Sweden, the UK, and the USA. **Health support:** Over April, May and June 2019, 3,094 refugees received TB awareness training.
