
- Syria: From its Damascus hub, IOM reached 1,700 beneficiaries with winter NFIs in cross-line and HTR areas. Through joint UN convoys, 1,000 people were reached with blankets and winterization kits in Rural Damascus, and 700 in the HTR area of Barza (Damascus). IOM also provided 207 trucks to UN agencies delivering humanitarian assistance to southern Syria.14,566 beneficiaries received shelter and NFI support in northern Syria.
- Jordan: IOM continues to provide numerous workshops and trainings on counter-trafficking and humanitarian border management. In order to raise awareness of human trafficking, IOM also provided 10 awareness-raising sessions to 547 high school students, including Syrian refugees and members of the host communities.
- Iraq: IOM provided vocational training in the hospitality sector to 47 beneficiaries in Erbil, as well as 76 people in Dahuk and Sulaymaniyah. 263 Business Support and Enhancement Packages were also distributed to refugees, IDPs, and host community members.
- Turkey: IOM Turkey continues to support three food kitchens in Gaziantep, overall reaching 4,000 people every month. Over the upcoming period, IOM is aiming to strengthen monitoring of the kitchen, including looking at the nutritional content of the food provided.
- Lebanon: As part of the ongoing psychosocial support projects in the Bekaa, Baalbek, and Sarafand, IOM launched three sewing workshops. 40 women will learn how to design and make handbags and scarves, which will be sold at an exhibition at the end of



Through Their Eyes

56 year old Hamdan lost his eyesight when he was 11 years old. He and his wife and their five children were displaced from Balah village in Rural Damascus to Al-Gozlania, 25 milometers away from Damascus city.

After his sister and his in-laws could no longer host the family, his wife and children moved into a one-bedroom house and depend on donations for rent. To ease some of the financial strains of Hamdan and his family, IOM provided NFI assistance.

Psychosocial Support Activities

The first of these educational booklets will be ready to print and disseminate by the end of March and will be used in educational lessons to improve and enhance the writing and reading skills of Syrian children.

Abdallah, a member of the host community in Ansar village, Nabatieh, was struggling to find employment to support his wife, three children, mother, sister, and nephew who have all been living under one roof. As part of the IOM activities targeting members of host communities as well as Syrian refugees, Abdallah began participating in a cash-for-work project that focuses on community and public rehabilitation works.

Not only does this enable Abdallah to support his family by earning enough money to cover some of his medical costs, food, and repay debts, but also contributes to positive community stabilization between Syrians and Lebanese, easing social tensions in areas that have seen an influx of refugees in the past years.

Winterization Activities

IOM Iraq concluded its winterization activities at the end of February through the members in an effort to target not only seasonal priority needs but also positively impact social cohesion.

Vocational Training and Livelihood Support

In coordination with the Swedish Academy for Training in Erbil, IOM launched a pilot training in the hospitality sector targeting 47 beneficiaries; this included English language classes and courses in waitressing and front-desk operations.

IOM also continues to support the construction of a market place in Daratu community in Erbil. Once completed in April, the market will host 60 shops. Beneficiaries will promote social cohesion through livelihood support.

Psychosocial Support and Peacebuilding

IOM staff who was previously trained in puppetry by No-Strings International have conducted a three-day puppetry workshop in Kawergosk camp, Erbil, to strengthen social cohesion and resilience. 30 boys and girls, including Syrian refugees, IDPs, and children from host communities were guided through a video depicting a community in conflict, learned how to make puppets, and put together a small puppet show.

Through Their Eyes

After their home in the suburbs of Damascus was hit by airstrikes in 2013, Mohammed, his wife, their five children, and Mohammed's mother fled Syria. They now live in Kawer Gosik camp for Syrian refugees near the city of Erbil in the Kurdistan region of northern Iraq. In Syria,

Mohammed had cultivated and managed farmland, but at the camp he struggles to find work, doing whatever he can from construction work to sales assistant. As the family could no longer cope with the financial burden, Mohammed had to take his 12 year old son out of school so he could help support the family.

"My son is so smart! It tore my heart to pull him out of school. I want him to continue to have an education. I want to improve our situation so he can go back to school."

Through IOM's livelihood programme, Mohammed received a three-month vocational training to become a barber, and after completion, he received a barbering toolkit (pictured right).

"I am really grateful. I look forward to starting my own business. Barbering is a good job, and I hope I can earn enough to buy food for my family, diapers, and medicine for my mother. Most importantly, I want to send my son back to school."

Trainings, Workshops and Awareness Sessions

An advanced training-of-trainers (TOT) was conducted from 21 to 28 February on counter-trafficking in order to enhance the capacity of government and civil society actors; they had previously received TOT in December.

In addition, ten awareness-raising sessions on human trafficking were held for high school students (pictured below), targeting a total of 274 boys and 273 girls in Irbid, Ramtha, Mafraq, Zarqa, and Karak, where the risk of human trafficking is higher. Students were taught about the effects of trafficking, including forced child labor and early marriage.

IOM also conducted trainings of 101 border guards and Royal Medical Service officers on humanitarian border management, with topics such as integrated border management, standard operating procedures in receiving and assisting Syrian refugees, the UN Convention against Transnational Organized Crime and its protocols, and countertrafficking.

Through Their Eyes

Abdel Majid, his wife, and son Maher (pictured above) came to Azraq camp in May 2014 after fleeing his home in Rural Damascus where he used to be a plumber.

Since living in the camps, Abdel Majid is working as a volunteer with IOM, assisting new arrivals and welcoming other Syrians.

His wife, who was a primary school teacher for math, Arabic, and French is now a teacher assistant working in the school for refugee children.

Abdel Majid says that "In general, things are easier now [compared to when they first arrived], but life in the camp is still difficult."



Update on Winterization Activities

In February, IOM finalised winterization distributions, including assisting support from November to the end of February 2016. Assistance included stoves, coal, NFIs, vouchers, and cash cards, targeting Sanliurfa, Hatay,

School Transportation

On 8 February, IOM began to support the Temporary Education Centre in Batman Province with school transportation. While 304 primary, secondary, and high school students are currently enrolled, numbers may increase over the coming months due to the transportation provided by IOM which will enable access for families that cannot afford the cost of public transport.

With IOM currently supporting six schools in total, agreements have been established with four service providers who are shuttling the children to and from school daily with 118 school buses.

Over this period, IOM also developed a training module for bus drivers on child protection and protection from sexual exploitation and abuse. All 118 bus drivers will be trained over the following months. Consent forms for parents were developed and will be disseminated.

IOM Turkey has also taken the lead on a school transportation policy paper in the Education Working Group, in collaboration with UNICEF and NGO partners.
