Highlights

● **Syria:** In June, over 129,000 individuals were reached through provision of Non-Food items and Shelter assistance from Damascus, Jordan and Turkey.

● **Jordan:** IOM held a series of events for children in Azraq and Za'atari refugee camps as part of activities to mark the World Refugee Day, in coordination with the Jordanian authorities, UNHCR and CARE International.

● **Iraq:** Between 23 and 30 June, 6,480 supplementary kits were distributed in Erbil in Baserma, Qushtapa, Kawergosik and Darashakran in coordination with UNHCR. These kits included pillows, rechargeable lights, and 40 litre cool boxes.

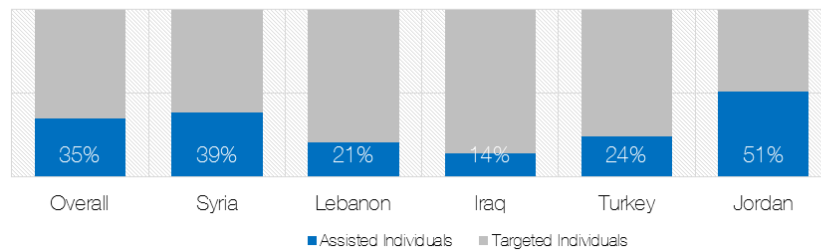
● **Turkey:** On 5 June, IOM co-facilitated a workshop on MHPSS for 19 NGOs working in the South East of Turkey. The workshop was organized by UNHCR in line with the establishment of the MHPSS Sub Working Group. Furthermore, during the reporting period, IOM began supporting school transportation for students to attend summer school in Sanliurfa province.

● **Lebanon:** On 22 June, 29 psychosocial professionals from Syria and Lebanon graduated from an Executive Professional Masters course run by IOM and the Lebanese University (LU) on "Psychosocial Support and Dialogue." The graduation followed a final session in which the students presented their final fieldwork and research to a panel of trainers from IOM and LU.

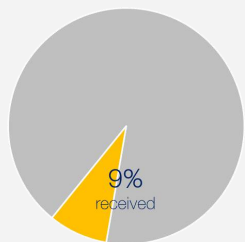

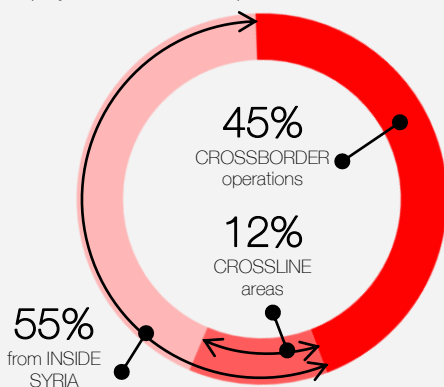

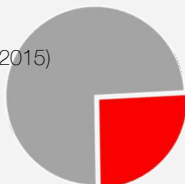

Due to escalation of violence, OCHA estimates that about 120,000 people were displaced from Al-Hassakeh city as a result of fighting from 25 to 30 June.

Around 10,000 displaced women, men and children in Qamishli, Westa and other rural areas in Al-Hassakeh governorate are being assisted with 6,809 basic Non-Food items including mattresses, baby diapers, summer blankets and clothing kits. IOM has on-going presence and distribution activities on the ground, and plans to escalate assistance to respond to increasing needs.

Human Interest Story

FROM INSIDE SYRIA

IOM met 9-year-old Rateb and his family during a visit to IOM's local partner's office in Aleppo, where Rateb and his sibling Rana were attending speaking articulation sessions to improve their ability to converse. Rateb's father is a taxi driver whose income was directly affected by the conflict as mobility became restricted; he can hardly cover the house rental.

Consequently, the family could not afford the cochlea implants for their two children, nor could they afford the hearing disability rehabilitation sessions that the children used to attend. Upon the family's return to their home, they were informed of the services provided by IOM's partner and sought the organization for help.

A few months after the siblings received the ear pieces, Rateb and Rana integrated better with their peers in school. Rateb and Rana are two of 74 beneficiaries in Aleppo that received hearing aid assistance from IOM.

The graduation followed a final session in which the students presented their final fieldwork and research to a panel of trainers from IOM and LU, including the Head of IOM's Mental Health, Psychosocial Response and Intercultural Communication Section. The course began in November 2014, and included modules on Psychosocial Support, Dialogue and Meditation, and Arts and Culture.

Registration/Profiling exercise in Lebanon

From 20 April to 31 May, IOM and the Lebanese High Relief Commission ran a project to register and profile Lebanese returnees from Syria across the country, reaching a total of 5,245 households (28,574 individuals) at nine registration centres across the country.

Preliminary findings of the project highlight the distinct needs of Lebanese returnees, over four years into the crisis.

- 20% of individuals declared a specific health-related need;
- The majority were living in the Bekaa (47%) and Akkar (38%). 14% were living in single room units, substandard shelters, unfinished buildings, or in collective shelters;9% were in formal settlements;
- 28% of 18 - 59 year olds were working as daily wage earners, 26% were unemployed;
- Asked about their intentions, 40% said they planned to return to Syria and 29% that they would integrate locally.

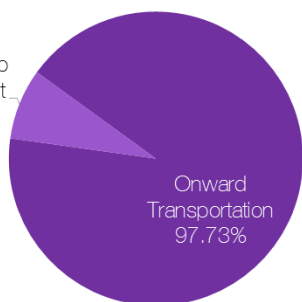

Syrian refugees continue to return to Syria. In the beginning of June, there were approximately 200 returnees daily. This has since reduced to 35 individuals daily by end of June.

WFP are planning on cutting all food assistance to refugees outside of camps from August. This was announced to refugees on 1 July, via SMS. As food assistance will continue inside of camps, it is anticipated that there will be a large movement of Syrians into Azraq camp – the only camp with spare capacity.

Starting on 3 June and due to heavy fights at Tel Abyad border, Turkey received an influx of 22,697 persons within two weeks. The majority of people were entering from Akcakale border.

Due to the recent developments in Akcakale, IOM has provided NFI kits for 300 households (consisting of 1,679 individuals). The households received an NFI kit each containing of mattresses, pillows, floor mats and plastic sheets.
