IOM's CCCM programming currently targets 17,320 displaced families living in 142 displacement sites in four governorates (Marib, Ibb, Taizz and Al Hudaydah). CCCM teams support integrated IOM WASH, SNFI, and Protection activities in these sites and mobilize external partners to ensure a minimum service package is provided. The programme also provides technical advice and capacity building for authorities acting as camp administration, IDP camp committees, and national non-governmental organizations working in site management. Currently, the CCCM programme is focusing on scaling up operations across the country. IOM has increased staff capacity and presence, with the hiring of three International CCCM operations officers in Marib, and an additional international officer to cover Ibb and Taizz, as well as the ongoing recruitment of national teams across all governorates.

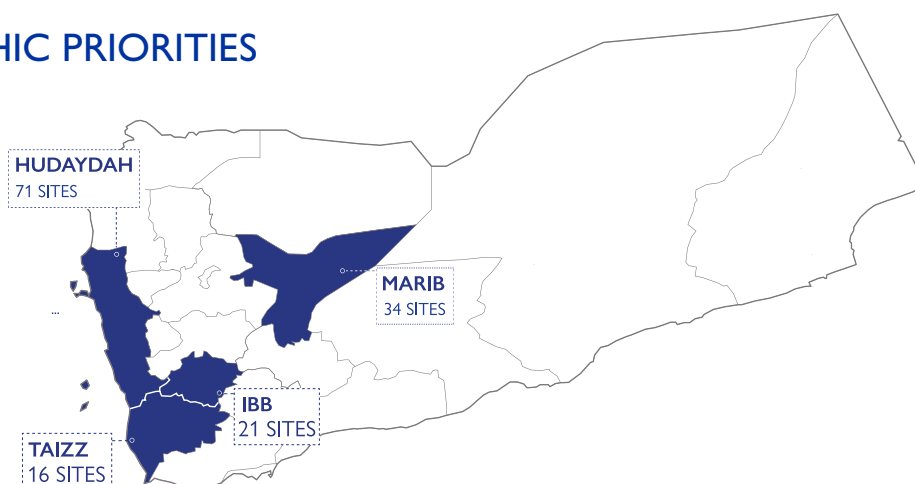
COORDINATION AND SERVICE MONITORING IN IDP SITES

In this quarter, IOM has strengthened site management and coordination support in 21 IDP sites in Ibb, 16 IDPs sites in Taizz and 34 sites in Marib. The daily presence of Site Management and Coordination teams at IDP hosting sites and camps has been effective in reducing vulnerabilities and improving protection for IDPs. In Ibb and Taizz, where urban displacement is prevalent, IOM is working to prevent and respond to housing, land and property (HLP) issues. IOM teams have been coordinating with authorities and landowners in 9 sites in Taizz and Ibb to prevent forced eviction and identify alternative housing arrangements for some 220 HHs (1074 individuals) living in informal settlements or public buildings.

COMMUNITY MOBILIZATION AND CAPACITY BUILDING

IOM's CCCM team is providing displaced communities with the tools and support necessary to self-manage displacement sites. In this quarter, IOM provided formal trainings to site representatives focused on key skills such as coordination, information management, community participation and monitoring of site risks. Two trainings held in Marib brought together 33 members of the Jufainah camp committees and sector representatives, as well as 29 site representatives from 12 IDP hosting sites in Marib City. Trainings included representatives from women's committees as well as marginalized groups. Together, these community leaders represent and advocate for nearly 7,000 IDP households.

GEOGRAPHIC PRIORITIES



CARE AND MAINTENANCE OF SITE INFRASTRUCTURE

The CCCM team takes a participatory approach to site improvements. In Ibb and Taizz, IOM is currently working with site committees to rehabilitate 17 IDP hosting sites. Teams work with displaced communities to form care and maintenance committees in each site, helping to identify site risks and priority interventions. IOM then provides technical support and on-the-job training to carry out site improvements, such as improving critical shelters, rehabilitating communal infrastructure, carrying out flood risk mitigation works or providing solar-powered electricity. Overall, IOM has strengthened self-governance mechanisms in 37 sites, through the establishment of 35 site committees. These committees notify IOM when there are urgent needs or gaps, help strengthen communication with IDPs, and provide support with tracking new arrivals and departures.

IN FOCUS: ENHANCING CCCM CAPACITY IN MARIB

IOM established a sub-office in Marib in May 2019 and has since scaled up humanitarian response activities for the 750,000 IDPs in the governorate (IOM DTM data). As the sole UN Agency with staff presence in Marib, IOM is actively working in IDP sites, and coordinating with the Marib Executive Unit (the primary local body for engagement on humanitarian issues) to monitor and address service gaps. IOM is the CCCM and SNFI sub-national cluster coordinator for Marib governorate and has held two meetings with partners engaged in camp and out-of-camp responses, sharing information from needs assessments conducted, as well as updated camp population information, and highlighting gaps and overlaps in response. Through the CCCM Cluster, IOM also works with local organizations active in Marib on capacity building and mobilizing support or funding at the national level to

fill service gaps and ensure the needs and response are reflected at the national level.

In September, IOM completed rapid assessments across 22 sites in Marib, hosting 6,114 families (42,798 individuals). Assessments showed that nearly 86% of sites outside of Marib City do not have access to markets, public services or income opportunities, and 64% of sites do not have appropriate shelter structures or materials, or adequate covered space. Only 1 of the 22 sites surveyed has sufficient waste collection systems or tap stands. Furthermore, 7 sites (32%) are located in flood prone areas. While 2 sites are near to front lines and 4 are inaccessible in adverse weather due to road conditions, the remaining sites are accessible to humanitarian agencies, have room for safe expansion of shelters, as well as room for additional services, SNFI storage and recreational spaces.



In Al-Jufainah camp, IOM site management teams are coordinating the establishment of a static health clinic and a camp administrative building, to support the 30,000 camp residents. The international CCCM Site Planner has also carried out assessments of existing camp infrastructure, topography and services and held consultations with the camp population to inform site reconfiguration, site improvements and design of an expansion area for new arrivals, aligned with priorities and needs. CCCM and WASH teams are working jointly to carry out flood risk mitigation measures following two flooding events during the reporting period which impacted a total of 79 households in the camp. In addition, IOM has begun to roll out fire safety training and distribution of fire extinguishers in partnership with the local civil defense teams. The first trainings in October 2019 will target 3 informal settlements in Marib city, as well as Jufainah Camp, all of which have experienced fires in the last month.
